He even finds songs dating back to 1929. Some of his mixes feature historical recordings such as Big Bill Broonzy's "See See Rider" (1934), Mississippi Sheiks' "I'll be Gone, Long Gone" (1931), Charley Patton's "A Spoonful Blues" (1929), and Leadbelly's "Where Did You Sleep Last Night" (1944). If you're new to blues, these groundbreaking songs will stick with you like your first kiss.

If you're exploring blues anthologies, try anything by Kwolek. He packs true classics into his compilations, squeezing as many songs as possible. His HQ Best Blues mix offers over two-and-a-half hours of well-produced music, featuring great artists. Naming it the "best" takes guts, but Kwolek's mixes prove themselves.

The HQ Blues Compilation is a rare collection of tunes from various eras and styles, meticulously curated by Kwolek. It's hard to find albums of this quality, but he does the work—finding the music and crafting a high-quality listening experience.

With so many blues albums out there, Kwolek's HQ Blues Compilation stands out. You'll keep it in your player for a long run. As one of the few DJs truly dedicated to the genre, Kwolek provides an excellent resource for both blues lovers and newcomers.
